#### **ORISSA SUPER CYCLONE**

#### HEALTH HAZARDS AND HOMOEOPATHY

Department of Meteorology forecasted / warned on 28<sup>th</sup> October, 1999 onwards about a severe cyclone that would strike the coastal areas of Orissa, some where between Gopalpur-on-sea (in Sourthern Orissa) and the Sagar Island (in West Bengal) in next 48 hours. Later warnings indicated that the Cyclone had intensified further in to "Super Cyclone". When the cyclone finally slammed into the coast of Orissa on October 29<sup>th</sup> & 30<sup>th</sup> 1999, it left the state in a condition of stunned and stupefaction. Never was a calamity before, of such magnitude and of such ferocity to struck the state. (1)

The cyclonic storm and flood that caused serious devastation of the coastal 14 districts of the state which were considered as the prosperous landscape of Orissa totaling 19,000 villages and 28 Municipal areas with about 13 million people affected and 1.65 million houses damaged and destroyed. (2)

Of course, storms and cyclones were not new to the state, it was a regular visitor for the state between June to November. This time having just born and brunt of a severe cyclone 11 days earlier in the sourthern coast of the state followed by this Super Cyclone of this intensity / magnitude was a matter of deep concerned to the administrators / ecologists / epidemiologist / physicians / environmentalists / psychologists etc. However no one could anticipate the severity of the event, nor could they know that it would last for 36 hours; nor that could more so far in land as to engulf / effect even the state capital, the nerve centre of the state, Bhubaneswar. (3)

Only on the evening of October 30 did the torrential rain and gushing winds stop, after the cyclone raged for two days the cyclone wrought enormous destruction to life starting from unicellular organization to homosepiens, property, trees, houses, electricity, telephone structures, roads etc. Everything succumbed to its furry. Affected areas were left without water supply, without food, without communication rail and road, without electricity, without telephone. (4)

Following this kind of devastation, humanitarian assistants poured from various corners, including national to international bodies. In an humble way the N.S.S. Division of Dr. A.C. Homoepathic Medical College & Hospital, Bhubaneswar with all teachers and students went to the affected areas with medical treatment unit for continuously a period of 15 days. The kind of patients came for treatment and remedies required are projected below.

- Respiratory disorders (includes common cold, pharyngitis / bronchitis / bronchial asthma etc.) – 30.49%.
- G. I. disorders (includes dyspepsia, indigestion) 8.66
  (diarrhoea / dysentery / vomiting / constipation) 19.32%
- 3. Fever (viral / malaria / enteric) 12.66%
- 4. Sinusitis 8%
- 5. Injuries -7%
- 6. Skin (scabies / fungal infection, boils) 6.6%
- 7. Conjunctivitis 3%
- 8. Miscellaneous 2.33 %

#### Conclusion:

From above study it is envisaged that

- a) Diseases commonly occurring after cyclone are
  - Respiratory disorders (common cold / pharyngitis / bronchitis / bronchial asthma etc.)
  - ii. G.I. disorders (dyspepsia / diarrhoea / dysentery / constipation / vomiting)
  - iii. Fever (malaria / viral / enteric)
  - iv. Sinusitis
  - v. Injuries
  - vi. Skin Disorders (scabies / fungal infection / boils)
  - vii. Conjunctivitis

- b) Homoeopathic remedies required are polycrest / common drugs such as: Rhus tox., Bry.alb., Bell., Ars.alb., Carbo veg., Gels., Puls., Merc.sol., Nux vom., Arn mont. etc.
- c) Above learning can be useful for future planning for Homoeopathic treatment for such occurances at any part of the world.
- d) Apart from that, it is concluded that Homoeopathic medicine do act curatively and has ample scope to combat the conditions / diseases created / noticed, after cyclone.
